I am inspired by the outstanding achievements of our dedicated staff, who work tirelessly to advance our mission to end violence against women and children. I'm especially grateful for the opportunity to work alongside our Executive Director, Michelle Smith, and most recently our Interim Executive Director, Sadita Graham, whose leadership has been nothing short of transformative. Sadita has not only guided the organization through a period of transition with compassion and clarity, she has stabilized the agency, strengthened internal operations, and reinforced our commitment to service excellence. Her impact has been felt across every level of Sandgate, and we are deeply grateful for her dedication.

While Sandgate has faced challenges this year, we have remained steadfast in our commitment to the women and children we serve. Through resilience, teamwork, and a clear focus, we have continued to make meaningful progress on our three-year strategic priorities to provide safe shelter and transitional housing, deliver advocacy & support services and breaking cycles of violence through prevention-based programming.

One of our most exciting developments is the Traditional Housing Project. With architectural plans finalized and funding secured, we are on track to break ground in mid-2026, with a targeted completion date of mid-2028. This project will expand our capacity to provide safe shelter and transitional housing to women and children in need. We are also proud to announce that the Ellen Sands Memorial Bursary will restart in 2026. This bursary provides financial support to a woman who have been assisted by Sandgate in pursuing post-secondary education or skills training. Honoring Ellen's memory and her belief in the power of education and independence, the bursary will help to empower women to build brighter futures for themselves and their children.

In the coming weeks, we are excited to resume programs at our Richmond Hill site, restoring essential services to families in our community. This reopening is a testament to our organizational resilience and the strength of our support systems—for both the women and children we serve and our dedicated staff.

Our sincere gratitude goes out to the United Way of Greater Toronto, our planning consultants, architects, funders, and donors who make our work possible. Special thanks to our incredible staff and Board members for their tireless commitment to this important work.

As we move forward, we do so with an unwavering commitment to our feminist, anti-violence mission, while continuing to adapt to meet the evolving needs of women and children across York Region.

An Update our transitional housing project



Lynn Butler, Transitional project lead

Sandate's Transitional Housing Project has been many years in the making. The first major step was in 2022 with the donation of funds to purchase property. Then this past year it was full steam ahead as we organized to secure funding and undertake required studies and surveys.

We engaged the planning consultants and the architect and began the planning process. The new building will host a combination of 10 one-bedroom and studio units that will house from 15 – 20 individuals for up to four years. The complex features a common room and laundry area for residents and colourful accents that will bring life to the two-storey structure, helping it to blend comfortably with the neighbourhood. We anticipate breaking ground in mid-2026 with a target completion date in mid-2028.

This initiative is an important next step in how we support women and their children as they transition from emergency shelters to independent living. It will help those who are ready to move forward but still face barriers like discrimination and affordability to securing stable housing.

Remembering our history

Sandgate was named in memory of Ellen Sands - beloved friend, daughter, sister, aunt, and mother. Ellen was also a woman who suffered from domestic abuse, which ultimately led to her death in January 1991 at the age of 39. In the span of 18 months, prior to Ellen's death, two other women were killed by their abusers. This all took place in Georgina, a town of only 10,000 people.

These deaths promoted an outpouring of support for action towards ending violence against women in the community.

In June of 1992 at the official opening of Sandgate, the people were asked to express their thoughts and wishes for 15 years in the future. One note in particular reads:

"When all seems lost, remember women's strength begins life, supports love and lives forever."


